Becoming a biosphere reserve...

Why a new biosphere reserve here?



Geology

The area exhibits many interesting geological shapes and features. The surrounding ridges were created by bedrock movements 400 million years ago. The area is the zone between the Baltic shield and the Euroasian plate. The soils and some landforms in the area were formed during the last ice age.



Biodiversity

Approximately 15,600 species are registered in Storkriket. In the area, 1,054 red-listed species have been recorded. This represents 22% of the country's red-listed species, while Storkriket accounts for only 0,25% of the country's total area.



Food production and water supply

The areas contain one of the best agricultural soils in Sweden and water supply from the area is important - even beyond the borders of Storkriket.

Outdoor recreation

The area serve as a green lung for southwestern Scania. Storkriket offers a variation of recreation opportunities important for public health and local economies.



Rich cultural values Cultural landscape, cultural history is unique.



Research and innovation Environment

The three major universities lying within or close by is , Lund University, Malmö University and the Swedish University of Agricultural Sciences (SLU Alnarp). Lund university is repeatedly ranked as one of the top 100 in the world.



Nature and landscape in Storkriket

Storkriket is the core area in Sweden for the Scandinavian red deer. Hearing the roar of red deer on a calm September night is perhaps one of the strongest nature experiences to be found in Storkriket

There are many species associated with meadows and sandy soils, including the pasqueflower. Grazing domestic animals in Storkriket contribute to biodiversity and keep the landscape open

Valuable food production

Parts of the area has one of the best agricultural soils in Sweden, very important for the self sufficiency of the country.

The area produce significant amounts of cereal, canola sugar beets.

There are several major conflicts of interest related to agricultural land, including minimizing construction on agricultural land, as well as conflicts of interest regarding environmental destruction linked to production.

Rich cultural values

Storkriket is the most castle-dense part of Sweden with 14 castles

- Dalby Church is the oldest stone church in the Nordic region and was built in the 11th Century

- The cathedral in Lund became the seat of a bishop for all of Scania and Blekinge

- Flyinge Kungsgård a one of the oldest stud farms in the world, dating back to the 12th century





The stork – a symbol that change is possible

The stork was a common sight in the old Scanian agricultural landscape. Then something happened. Humans began to farm the land in new ways, and the stork disappeared. In 1954, the last pair of storks nested in Sweden, in Storkriket, on a farm along the river Klingavälsån before they became extinct in Sweden,

Since the 1980s, people have been working to bring wild storks back to the landscape – and in 2014, the first wild pair nested again in the area. It is a story about the human relationship with nature. How we need it, how we impact it, and how that relationship is in no way static."
